India-Japan Teacher Collaboration: WhatsApp Interaction & Planning

1. Title

Online India-Japan Educational Exchange Session in collaboration with *Ms. Mizuho Tanabe*.

2. Purpose of the Session

The proposed online exchange session aims to strengthen educational collaboration between India and Japan. It seeks to promote cross-cultural understanding among students and faculty while sharing the academic and professional outcomes of the Japan teacher exchange programme. The session will serve as a platform for sustained institutional engagement.

3. Objectives

The session intends to introduce Indian culture, values, and the education system to Japanese high school students. It will highlight Yoga as a globally accepted practice for physical and mental well-being. Additionally, the session will share key academic, pedagogical, and cultural learnings gained through the Japan exchange programme.



4. Date, Time & Mode

The online session will be held on Saturday, February 7, from 11:20 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. (JST). Zoom will be used to facilitate smooth participation and interaction.

5. Participants

Participants include Japanese high school students, faculty members, and the session coordinator, *Ms. Mizuho Tanabe*. A guest educator from India will lead the academic exchange.

6. Key Discussion Areas

Discussions will focus on Indian culture, lifestyle, educational values, and Yoga. Learnings from the Japan exchange programme will be shared to encourage cross-cultural perspectives.

7. Expected Outcomes

The session is expected to enhance intercultural understanding and student interest in global education. It will also help strengthen long-term India–Japan academic partnerships.



India-Japan Teacher Collaboration: WhatsApp Interaction & Planning

- After returning from the Japan Teacher Exchange Programme, I initiated academic communication with *Ms. Ayaka Negishi* (Japan) to explore further collaboration.
- We coordinated through WhatsApp, keeping in mind our academic schedules and the India–Japan time difference.
- Ms. Negishi showed interest in having an initial discussion and shared:
“Thank you! Could we have a quick meeting beforehand on Monday?? ♡”
- We mutually agreed to keep the interaction short and focused, highlighting effective time management, as she mentioned:
“I can talk with you if it is a short conversation! ● ”
“about 15–25 min!”
- We also discussed the mode of communication, and she asked:
“Do you have a zoom URL?”
- The conversation then moved towards planning future collaboration, with her positive response:
“Good idea!! Let’s talk about details on Monday! ✨”
- Through this interaction, I observed a strong willingness for collaboration, professionalism, and shared enthusiasm for strengthening India–Japan educational exchange.



My LEArnings from JApAn

- During my teacher exchange programme in Japan, I closely observed everyday school practices that left a strong impression on me.
- I was inspired by the high level of discipline, respect for time management, shared responsibility for cleanliness, and the spirit of collaborative teaching among teachers and students.
- These practices create a calm, organized, and positive learning environment where everyone feels responsible for the school community.
- I plan to implement these learnings in my own school by:
 - ★ Encouraging better discipline and punctuality
 - ★ Involving students actively in maintaining cleanliness
 - ★ Promoting collaborative teaching and learning practices
- Adopting these practices will help create a more responsible, efficient, and supportive academic environment for both students and teachers.
